Beatrice Gilmore's Tori Hackett medals at track/field championships

Beatrice Gilmore third grader Tori Hackett arrived at the 2019 USATF Hershey Indoor Youth National Track and Field Championships hoping to improve upon her personal records against the best competition in the United States, however she ended up accomplishing much more.

Hackett ended the four day competition winning two medals in the 9-10-year-old division at the 2019 National Youth Championships.

On Friday night she placed fifth in the high jump by jumping a personal best of 3'5.25". The 8-year-old then had the shot put on Saturday where she threw 18'9" placing sixth.

Tori and her twin sister Vanessa both ran personal records in the 55 meter dash. Tori ran 8.99 seconds and Vanessa 9.43 seconds which ranked them as the seventh and 13th fastest 8-9-year-old competitors.



Tori will try competing in the triathlon at the 2019 AAU Junior Olympic Games this summer. The triathlon in track and field consist of three events; the 200m, high jump and shot put with competitors receiving a certain amount of points for their performances in each event. Competitors must have a unique mix of strength, speed and jumping ability to be successful; it's an introduction for youth who might think of competing in the decathlon or heptathlon which are Olympic events.


BG is taking part in two local reading rewards programs
