District awarded \$261K in tuition-free pre-K expandion funding

The Woodland Park School District was one of 28 that were notified this week of pre-K expansion grant funding awards. This \$20 million in funding to the 28 districts means that approximately 1,450 additional children across the state will have access to quality pre-K. Woodland Park received a grant of \$261,360 and was the only district in Passaic County to receive funding.

The goal to open full day pre-K in Woodland Park has been discussed and planned for the past six years, according to Superintendent Dr. Michele Pillari. "We are so proud that we are opening full day pre-K for our children," she said. "This is a tremendous opportunity for our children and our community."

The money awarded allows the district to fund its current pre-K program for this school year, which was expanded to serve up to 30 children. Going forth, the school district plans to reopen School #1 on McBride Avenue for the 2020-2021 school year and offer tuition-free pre-K to approximately 115-120 students.

School #1, which closed as a district school in the early 90s, has been rented the last number of years by charter schools. Renters have made significant improvements to the building over the years, putting the district in place to be able to reopen it for district use without impacting the general budget. When fully executed and operational, it is the intention of the expansion program to offer tuition-free pre-K to up to 215 students.

At the Sept. 4 Borough Council meeting, Mayor Keith Kazmark and the Borough Council presented a proclamation in acknowledgement of the expansion plans.

"This will be a great benefit to students who may not otherwise receive this type of education," Kazmark said. "This is a tremendous accomplishment and will have a long lasting effect on every child that comes in to the program."

Dr. Pillari noted that when the state expanded its grant funding available, the district jumped at the opportunity to apply for funds. Administrators, board members and Charles Olbon Principal Giovanna Irizarry worked on meeting the application requirements and deadlines.

"Mrs. Irizarry was instrumental in putting the application," she noted of the year-long process.

Special Police Officer will be stationed at each school this year

At Wednesday evening's Council meeting, the Borough swore in three Special Police Officers, who will serve in our Borough schools. Police Chief Eileen Tiernan said that the three bring a wealth of experience to the district. The officers are paid through a shared service agreement between the Borough and the Board of Education.

William Gilhooley will be returning for his sixth year as a school resource officer. He is a retired Captain from the Woodland Park Police Department where he served 28 years.

Andrew Poremba has 28 years experience. He worked for the Wyckoff Police Department where he was in charge of many functions within the department. In addition, he most recently worked security for the Glen Rock High School. Andrew's experience will make him an asset to our Police Department and school system.

Michael Cossari has 34 years of law enforcement experience, having recently retired from the Paterson Police Department. Michael worked in the detective bureau in major crimes for the last 15 years of his career. Michael, known as Mickey, will also be a great addition to our Police Department and school system.

Police Chief urges vigilance driving around Borough schools

Woodland Park Police Chief Eileen Tiernan reminds drivers to be extremely vigilant driving around our Borough schools before and after school hours, as many of our students walk home, and to expect minor delays. She also reminds those dropping off students to follow the school's drop off and pick up procedures and obey parking restrictions.

The Department will have officers present at each school daily. They are there to make drop off and pick up easier for parents. Drivers and those walking are asked to pay attention to their directions.

Afternoon hours are particularly dangerous. Over the last decade, AAA reports that nearly one in four child pedestrian fatalities occurred between 3 and 7 p.m. Here's how you can help keep kids safe:

- Slow down. Speed limits in school zones are reduced for a reason.

- Come to a complete stop. Research shows that more than one-third of drivers roll through stop signs in school zones or neighborhoods. Always come to a complete stop, checking for children on sidewalks and in crosswalks before proceeding.

- Eliminate distractions. Research shows that taking your eyes off the road for just two seconds doubles your chances of crashing. Reduce risk by not using your cell phone or eating while driving, for example.

In addition, we are excited to introduce a new instructional block of time for all students to focus on the foundational skills of reading, vocabulary and word study.

This summer we continued our work in partnership with Rutgers University and New Jersey Department of Education on our New Jersey Tiered System of Supports (NJTSS) initiative. The NJTSS is an evidence-based framework for implementing academic and behavioral supports and interventions to improve achievement for all students. Our work has allowed us to implement a universal screening districtwide in both CO and BG Schools. We have developed diagnostic tools and plans for progress monitoring and revised our basic skills entrance and exit criteria based on our analysis. This grant partnership spans across grades K-3, however we will be expanding it to fourth grade and plan to begin the universal screening process at Memorial School this fall.

Revisions to our K-8 mathematics curriculum as well as new programs and resources have been secured in order to support our continued focus on student achievement. New indicators have been embedded into the curriculum in order to demonstrate differentiated instruction through a more scaffolded approach. Teachers will continue to develop lessons and instructional strategies based on math centers/stations which will enhance instructional practice through modeling, analysis, and theoretical approaches to teaching math. This summer, time was also spent developing an advanced curriculum for the 7th grade pre-algebra class which provides students with an understanding of both 7th and 8th grade standards.

To support all of these approaches to teaching math, BG and CO Schools have revised the standards based report card to reflect the new units in the curriculum. A rubric has also been created and is available to parents in order to assist with interpretation of the information presented on the report cards.

We are excited to introduce ixl.com for grades 2-8 for the upcoming school year. Each child will have access to this online program at home. IXL is a great resource to help each child excel in math class. This program provides students with opportunities to practice the content being studied in the classroom. It also provides insight into each student's academic progress.

In September, CO and BG Schools will be working with another math program which supports differentiated and individualized learning. This program, Happy Numbers, builds an individual-paced math dialogue and responds to students by unpacking concepts step-by-step, scaffolding learning, and providing immediate feedback based on student input.

Please keep on the lookout for a math webpage on the district's website. Here you will find any and all information about our district's math programs, growth mindset analogies, curriculum pacing guides, and rubrics.

Memorial School will be implementing a 9 period schedule in September. This period will allow for enrichment opportunities for the students. This will include support in the areas of language arts and math as well as opportunities to participate in clubs, character education activities, and have many other student self-elected educational experiences throughout the year.

The addition of Period 9 also allows teachers to have a professional learning period with their content area colleagues. This new configuration will allow for rich content discussions among colleagues facilitated by various members of our administrative team.

We will also be offering band as an elective course this school year. We look forward to seeing the music program grow. We have also added two new cycles to our schedule: STEM and study skills/research.

As always, the technology department has been working diligently this summer to prepare all of our technological needs. District servers have been updated with improved speed and uptime of the network. All laptop carts at CO School have been upgraded. New Chromebooks have been purchased for BG School as part of our transition to Google during the upcoming school year. We are happy to announce that we have begun the installation process of video camera upgrades at CO School in order to increase the level of security both inside and outside of the building. In addition, reimaging and regular maintenance to the computers in our district has been ongoing and continuous throughout the summer months. Please join me in thanking our technology team for working on this during the summer months for a successful implementation in September.

Mr. Grimes and our custodial team have been working tirelessly this summer in order to get the buildings and grounds ready for the opening of school. For student safety, the gym floors in each school have been sanded and polyurethaned.
