Charles Olbon School recently instituted and created a display its school-wide rules. There are three of them: Be a Leader. Be a Worker. Be a Friend


Hands On Learning

Memorial School HSA selling reusable discount cards



Students of the month chosen as part of Character Education Program

In the fall of 2017, Memorial School implemented a Character Education Program called the "6 Pillars of Character Education." These six principles are trustworthiness, respect, responsibility, fairness, caring, and citizenship. They can be found in the district's Code of Conduct. Students have character education instruction each week.

In addition there is a "Students of the Month" program. Last year, one from each homeroom



was chosen. This year, there will be one student per grade selected as "Student of the Month" each month. "These students are chosen because they possess the attributes of 'a student of character," according to Principal Lisa Barreto. "They 'represent' their grade for that month."

As Omegaman tore the book in half he explained that the kids can erase bad choices they've made and start fresh. When he bent the steel bar, he noted how bad choices can stop someone from being on a straight path but they can keep going on a straight path by making good choices.

The lively presentation covered numerous themes. Students were encouraged to be a "dream-maker," not a "dream-breaker." They learned that they can all be heroes by following the H.E.R.O. way: Helping Everyone Respect Others. Omegaman also stressed to students that it's important they recognize and report bullying. By doing this, they are an upstander, not a bystander.

Students and staff concluded Week of Respect by wearing spirit wear or shirts in the school colors of blue and/or gold to show unity in the common goal of being respectful to everyone and making the school and community the best it can possibly be.
