Assembly at Memorial focuses on natural highs

Memorial School students were treated to an assembly funded by the Municipal Alliance Against Alcoholism & Drug Abuse with Matt Bellace, a youth motivational speaker and stand-up comedian. Dr. Bellace has a Ph.D. in clinical neuropsychology and author of the book, "A Better High." The program, "A Better High," focused on natural highs, emotional resilience and mental health. The presentation was a combination of stand-up comedy, interactive demonstrations and stories.

He started by doing a tower support exercise with a group of eight students, to illustrate to them the power of support from their peers.

Bellace had the students do a short meditation to stress the benefits of the practice. "Navy Seals use this to calm themselves," he said. "Your generation is chronically energized. There's so much light in your face." The use of electronics, especially at night suppresses melatonin, which is essential to good sleep.

Municipal Alliance door decorating contest winners are announced

The Alliance is a volunteer based community group that is funded by the Governor's Council on Alcoholism and Drug Abuse.

During Red Ribbon Week, which was marked Oct. 23-31, all the schools had different theme days, such as wearing red, funny socks or team jerseys. Local Daisy and Girl Scouts put out red ribbons outside of the schools. In all three schools, there was a door decorating contest where classes displayed what underage drinking and using drugs means to them and how it is harmful.



Red Ribbon Week was kicked off with a free yoga and mindfulness class for families at Dowling Gardens and capped with the annual Trick or Trunk event last night where some 500 children spent an evening safely trick or treating to the 40 plus volunteer "trunks" in attendance.



Science Tellers program integrates stories with experiments

Beatrice Gilmore and Charles Olbon students both enjoyed a pre-Halloween treat Tuesday with a visit from the Science Tellers assembly program. Conrad Colón led the students through the story, "Aliens: Escape From Earth," where he integrated the story with science experiments to bring key parts of the story to life.

The story is about two curious kids who venture into the forest to investigate a midnight meteor shower and find themselves mixed up with a family of visitors from another planet. Pursued by a crazy space scientist, they must rescue the aliens and get them back to their spaceship before it's too late.

Volunteer students assisted in some of the experiments. They turned a liquid into solid "worms" through a chemical reaction, launched a potato into the air using Boyle's Law and made a flying rocket using two common household chemicals. During the experiments, Mr. Colón explained the physics and chemistry concepts.




Big Winners

Bellace also used music to illustrate the power of emotions, by playing a song guessing game, with songs like "Happy," "Thunderstruck," "Under Pressure," and "Lose Yourself." He encouraged them to listen to music, as well as exercise, as he said it releases endorphins, neurochemicals released by your body that produce a "natural high."

In telling the students about his brother, who suffered from drug addiction, he noted that addicts can overcome when they find something they love. "When you're struggling, lean on healthy people for support," he said. Learning how to express emotions in a healthy way is one of the most important things that they can do.
