Science Tellers program integrates science to bring story to life

Beatrice Gilmore students enjoyed a pre-Halloween treat Tuesday with a visit from the Science Tellers assembly program. Conrad Colón led the students through the story, "The Legend of the Golden Piano," where he integrated the story with science experiments to bring key parts of the story to life.

The story takes place in the Wild West, where a bank robber is to strike again. After the Sheriff mysteriously vanishes, two young kids foil the heist and get the bad guy behind bars.

Volunteer students assisted in some of the experiments. They made the colors of the sunset appear by using special pH indicators. They created the sound of fireworks by setting off a chain of chemical reactions with common household items. In addition, they witnessed the effects of inertia and gravity on a "runaway train."

During the experiments, Mr. Colón explained physics and chemistry concepts while also asking students to make their own hypothesis. Also after telling the story, he talked about its elements, making the assembly a true cross-curricular experience.
